

This SELF-GUIDED WALKING TOUR will take 30 minutes to one hour. It will introduce the visitor to the diversity of Riverside's social history as revealed in the material culture of the gravestones and their inscriptions.

EVERGREEN CEMETERY ASSOCIATION was established as a non-profit organization around 1870. Its founding members adopted the plan of the Rural Cemetery Movement and developed the land in a parklike setting to sanctify the dead with beauty and without regard to religious affiliation.

The RIVERSIDE MAUSOLEUM was built in 1914 in the style of the Egyptian Revival. It was designed to make the ancient royal and exclusive privilege of above ground burial available to all.

The MONUMENTS are of varied size, shape, material and craftsmanship suggesting varying degrees of affluence and aesthetic taste. The composition of the early community is inscribed with the names in Spanish, Korean, Danish, Chinese, German, French, Swedish, Portuguese, Dutch and English.

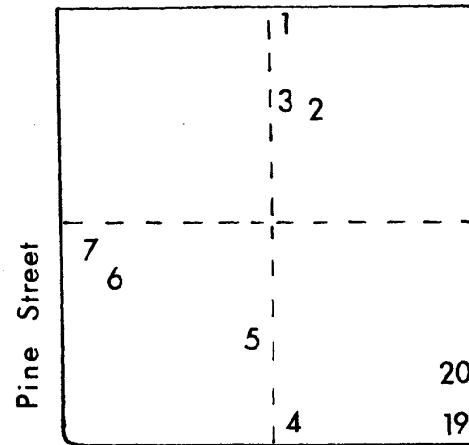
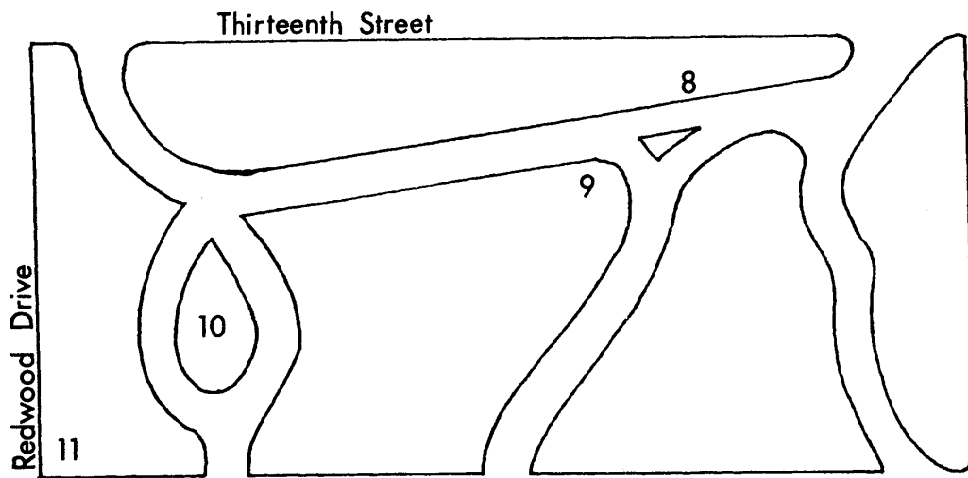
